Landslide strikes Army camp in Sikkim, three jawans killed, three go missing

Three army personnel died and six soldiers went missing after a landslide hit a military camp at Chhaten in Sikkim, a defence official said on Monday.

The landslide, which occurred at 7pm on Sunday near Lachen town in Mangan district, was triggered by heavy rainfall in the area, he said.

"... A catastrophic landslide occurred following intense and continuous rainfall in the region causing death of three combatants, identified as Havaldar Lakhwinder Singh, Lance Naik Munish Thakur, and Porter Abhishek Lakhada," an official said in a statement.

A massive landslide, triggered by heavy rains struck an Army camp at approximately 7 PM on June 1.

Four personnel with minor injuries have been rescued. Mortal remains of

Bodies of the personnel have been recovered, while four other soldiers were rescued with minor injuries, the official said in a statement.

"Rescue teams are working round-the-clock under challenging conditions to locate the six missing personnel," he said.

The army has expressed deep condolences to the families of the deceased and assured all necessary support, the defence official added.

The evacuation of stranded tourists began after the **Border Roads Organisation** (BRO) restored road connectivity to Lachung in Mangan district.

Met predicts more rain

The flood situation in Assam remained grim on Monday with the water levels rising in many parts of the state, officials said.

The India Meteorological Department's Regional Meteorological Centre (RMC) in Guwahati has said that moderate rainfall is very likely to occur at most places of Assam, while heavy to very heavy rainfall has been predicted at a few places and extremely heavy rainfall in isolated places.

A report by the Assam State Disaster Management Authority (ASDMA) on Sunday night said that two more people lost their lives in Cachar and Sribhumi districts, and around four lakh people are reeling under the deluge across 15 districts.

The total number of people losing their lives in this

The authorities have distributed 1,090.08 quintals of rice, 284.63 quintals of dal, 952.76 quintals of salt and

At present, 764 villages are under water and 3,524.38 hectares of crop areas have been damaged across Assam, the ASDMA said.

The man on whose complaint the Kolkata Police arrested Sharmishta Panoli, a 22-vear-old law student and Instagrammer studying in Pune, on charges of hurting Muslim sentiments, has been found to have posted multiple messages insulting Hindus and Hindu Gods and Goddesses. A complaint has been filed against him in

Wazahat Khan of Kolkata, who runs the Rashidi Foundation, has been found to have posted multiple social media posts denigrating Hindu deities and making vile comments against Sanatan Dharma. Despite this, he has not been arrested by the Kolkata police.

Wazahat Khan, claiming to be the general secretary of the Rashidi Foundation. had filed the FIR against Sharmishta Panoli and had taken the credit for ensur-



ing her arrest 1,500 km away from Gurgaon.

Sharmishta Panoli had posted an Instagram video lashing out at Pakistan in the aftermath of Operation Sindoor, which contained a reference to Prophet Mohammed, thereby offending Muslims.

Though she deleted the offending post and posted another video apologizing for her action, Kolkata Police travelled all the way to Gurugram and arrested her on Friday afternoon. She was brought to the city on transit remand and produced before the Alipore Police court on Saturday af-



ternoon and sent to judicial custody till June 13.

While being brought out of the court, a distraught Panoli said: "You cannot harass me like this. This is a democracy.'

Soon after Panoli's posts started getting criticised by Muslim community leaders across the country, she had deleted the offensive post on Instagram and apologised for her remarks

on X. In her post on X, Panoli had said: "I do hereby tender my UNCONDI-TIONAL APOLOGY.

RAJASTHAN REELS UNDER GANG VIOLENCE; THREE BRUTAL MURDERS IN FOUR DAYS

Rajasthan faces alarming gang violence with three brutal murders in four days, exposing police delays.

ajasthan is witnessing a disturb-Ling surge in gang violence, with three brutal murders reported in just four days. On Monday morning in Jhalawar, BJP leader Surendra Mewada was hacked to death with swords in Mandawara village. Police suspect the killing was linked to an old rivalry, as Mewada had previously been convicted in the Sattu Chaudhary murder case. The attack occurred around 7 am, when assailants struck Mewada with sharp weapons, leaving him bleeding on the ground before fleeing the scene. His family rushed him to Shri Rajendra Hospital in Jhalawar, where doctors declared him dead. A heavy police presence was deployed in the area follow-

wars. The first high-profile case in this wave of violence surfaced four days ago in Hanumangarh, where hotel owner Suresh Bijaraniya was shot dead in broad daylight in the Bhadra area. He

was chased and killed by two men on a motorcycle. Despite the brutal nature of the murder, the AGTF has vet to arrest any suspects. raising questions about law

On Sunday night in Chittorgarh, 33-year-old Ajay Raj Singh Jhala, son of a retired ASI, was brutally murdered. While dining with friends at a hotel near the Semalpura intersection, around 25 armed attackers arrived in seven vehicles, opened fire, and then threw Jhala from the hotel's first floor. They further assaulted him with a sword and set his car on fire before fleeing. The attackers are believed to be connected to the illegal mining mafia. Despite multiple emergency calls, police arrived only after the killing had occurred.

These unresolved murders and the slow police response have emboldened criminal gangs, leading to escalating violence and raising serious concerns about the state's law and order

Mahant Pratap Puri alleges political cover for ex-minister's aide visiting Pakistan

BJP MLA from Pokaran, Mahant Pratap Puri, on Monday alleged that Shakoor Khan Mangalia, former personal secretary to ex-Congress minister Saleh Mohammad, had travelled to Pakistan while serving as a government employee — allegedly under political protection. Addressing the media at the BJP state headquarters, Pratap Puri demanded an impartial probe into the matter, including an investigation into those who may have extended political cover to Khan.

Pratap Puri raised concerns about national security, noting that Khan was



closely associated with Saleh Mohammad for a long period and may have participated in military events held in the region alongside the former minister

"In such a scenario, the possibility of confidential information being leaked cannot be ruled out," he said.

He described the situation as one of serious concern and questioned whether the minister was unaware of the activities of his aide.

The BJP MLA said he

had taken up the matter with Chief Minister Bhajan Lal Sharma and BJP State President Madan Rathore, and had also written to the party's central leadership, urging a high-level, impartial inquiry. According to Pratap Puri, both Sharma and Rathore have taken the issue seriously and assured strict action. He added that Union Minister Gajendra Singh Shekhawat is also monitoring the matter closely. Expressing growing alarm over security issues in Rajasthan's border areas, Pratap Puri called for surveillance of institutions established by former public representatives in the region, especially those operating under the guise of religion or education.

JDA demolishes three illegal colonies, reclaims 15 bigha govt land

In a significant anti-encroachment operation, the Jaipur Development Authority (JDA) reclaimed 15 bigha of government land valued at Rs 45 crore near the JDA flats in Bagrana village (Zone-10). The land, recorded as Khasra No. 680/1, had been illegally occupied by local farmers who constructed cement strip boundaries and other unauthorized structures. Acting on directives from Zone-10 officials, the JDA enforcement team employed ICB machines and labourers to remove the encroachments.

In Zone-11, illegal constructions such as fencing, boundary walls, and iron gates along the 200-foot sector road boundary in Khatwada village-connecting Mahapura Khatwada to Nevta—were de-

Similarly, in Zone-13, the JDA enforcement squad dismantled three illegal colonies spread over 6 bigha of private agricultural land. These included two colonies along Agra Road in Gudha Chak Bassi and one in Isharwala village, where roads and structures had been developed without necessary approvals or land conversion.

The entire operation was overseen by Chief Controller of Enforcement, Adarsh Chaudhary, along with enforcement officers from Zones 10, 11, and 13.



Faculty members will now be allowed to speak freely with the evaluators, particularly during a scheduled meeting on June 5 in the QAC Hall. This marks a change from the administration's earlier stance issued on May 26, which limited communication to only authorised personnel-an order that drew criticism from the university community.

INDIA-PAK CONFLICT AND INTERNATIONAL LAW

∖he India-Pakistan relationship has been characterized by persistent tensions since the partition of 1947, with Kashmir remaining the central point of contention. Recent escalations, marked by the 22nd April, 2025 Pahalgam terror attack and India's retaliatory "Operation Sindoor" on 7th May, 2025, have brought the conflict under renewed international legal scrutiny. This article explores the legal aspects of the ongoing crisis, the role of International and Domestic Laws, and the broader implications for regional stability, drawing on principles of International

the UN Charter, and India's legal framework.

The latest flashpoint in the relations between India and Pakistan occurred when militants, allegedly linked to Pakistan-based Lashkar-e-Taiba, attacked a tourist convoy in Pahalgam, Kashmir, killing 26 people the deadliest terror strike in India since 2008. India responded with 'Operation Sindoor', launching 24 precision missile strikes on terrorist camps in Pakistan and Pakistan-occupied Kashmir

INDIA'S DOMESTIC

LEGAL FRAMEWORK India's response is guided by its Constitution and military doctrine. Article 355 imposes a duty on the Union to protect states from external aggression. India's evolving military doctrine, shifting from "deterrence by denial" to "deterrence by punishment," reflects a proactive stance against cross-border terrorism. The Ministry of Defence and Armed Forces operate Humanitarian Law (IHL), under dynamic Rules of

Engagement (ROE), allowing flexibility in response to threats like the Pahalgam attack. The Supreme Court, while typically deferring to the Executive on national security, can review actions to ensure constitutional compliance, particularly regarding fundamental rights. In a declared war, India's Constitution grants the Union extensive emergency powers under Article 352, including suspending fundamental rights, extending executive control over states, and legislating on state matters. The President, as Supreme Commander of the Armed Forces under Article 53(2), oversees military operations.

THE UN CHARTER **FRAMEWORK**

The cornerstone of modern international law regarding the use of force is Article 2(4) of the UN Charter, which states: "All Members shall refrain in their international relations from the threat or use of force against the territorial integrity or political independence of any state, or in any other manner inconsistent with the Purposes of the United Nations.'

This prohibition is considered a peremptory norm(jus cogens) of international law.

The Charter provides only two explicit exceptions to this prohibition:

Self-defense under Ar-

"Nothing in the present Charter shall impair the inherent right of individual or collective self-defence if an armed attack occurs against a Member of the United Nations, until the Security Council has taken measures necessary to maintain international peace and security."

UN Security Council authorization under Chapter VII for actions to maintain or restore international peace and security.

India has framed «Operation Sindoor» explicitly within the Article 51 framework, citing its inherent right to selfdefense following the Pahalgam terror attack.

A critical legal question is whether terrorist attacks can constitute an «armed attack» triggering the right to self-defense against a sovereign state. The International Court of Justice (ICJ) addressed this issue in the Nicaragua v. United States case (1986), establishing that an armed attack by non-state actors must be of "sufficient gravity" and attributable to a state to trigger self-defense against that state.

India's legal position relies on establishing that:

The Pahalgam attack was of sufficient gravity (26 civilian casualties).

The attack is attributable to Pakistan through its alleged support of terrorist outfits.

While Article 51 refers to

self-defense «if an armed attack occurs,» Customary International Law recognizes a limited right to anticipatory self-defense. This principle derives from the Caroline incident of 1837, establishing what is known as the Caroline test: the threat must be «instant, overwhelming, leaving no choice of means, and no moment for deliberation.»

India's missile strikes, coming after the Pahalgam attack, do not invoke anticipatory self-defense but rather responsive self-defense. However, India's new position that «any future act of terror will be treated as an act of war" suggests a potential shift toward a more expansive interpretation of self-defense that could include anticipatory elements. The International Court of Justice (ICJ) adjudicates disputes between states. In the Nicaragua case, the ICJ ordered reparations for damages caused by violations of international law. This precedent suggests potential avenues for legal redress between India and Pakistan, though political realities make such cases difficult. Neither India nor Pakistan has accepted the compulsory jurisdiction of the ICJ without reservations, limiting the court's role unless both parties consent to its jurisdiction in

a specific case. The International Crimi-

gram in 2024 to include

nal Court (ICC) prosecutes individuals for war crimes, crimes against humanity, genocide, and aggression. Neither India nor Pakistan are parties to the Rome Statute, placing them outside the ICC's jurisdiction unless the UN Security Council refers a situation to the court—a politically unlikely scenario given geopolitical alignments, particularly China's support

for Pakistan.

WAY AHEAD The India-Pakistan conflict presents a complex intersection of international legal principles concerning the use of force, state responsibility, humanitarian law, and bilateral agreements. India's recategorization of terrorism as an "act of war" signals a significant shift in its approach, potentially reshaping the application of International Law in this long-standing conflict. As both nations navigate this crisis, adherence to IHL, respect for bilateral agreements, and international cooperation are crucial to prevent further destabilization. The key takeaway for India is the urgent need for unity and restraint to avoid a broader conflict, fostering a "New India".

ZELENSKYY'S OPERATION SPIDERWEB: BRILLIANT **BUT RECKLESS**

Ukraine's Operation Spiderweb, which destroyed around 30% of Russia's strategic bomber fleet apparently 41 aircraft—will go down in the history books as one of the most ambitious and audaciously executed military plans ever. It was possible for Ukraine to target five key air bases housing these nuclear weapons-carrying aircraft deep inside Russia by launching the drones from close proximity. In the process, Ukraine caught the mighty Russian military machine off guard and dealt a body blow to Russia's nuclear deterrence. That Ukraine was able to smuggle in, or assemble, the drones and transport them hidden in trucks and operate them remotely, right under the nose of the Russian intelligence, tells a story of meticulous planning that went on for 18 months. With Ukraine not having the ability to breach Russia's air defences, the only way they could dent its nuclear triad was to launch the attack from deep inside, thus neutralising the safety of distance that the Russian bases enjoyed. And that's what the Ukrainians did. A complex military and intelligence operation, the Ukrainians, however, achieved a spectacular success at a very low cost, as drones are a cheap military option, but can cause brutal damage if deployed tactically. The operation also reminded the world of the changing nature of modern warfare, where a combination of drones and projectiles such as missiles and rockets can deal devastating blows to the adversary, as India did to Pakistan during Operation Sindoor.



However, Spiderweb may have been a brilliant operation tactically, but it was also a reckless operation, where no amount of tactical success can compensate for the enormity of the likely fallout—and in this case, the ripples might travel far and wide.

All eyes are now on Vladimir Putin, to see how he reacts to the attack, which is being described by the Russian media as Russia's Pearl Harbour moment, a reference best avoided because of its World War II connotations. The question uppermost on many minds is if the Russian nuclear fleet getting hit would also result in Russia exercising its "right to use" nuclear weapons in case of a major conventional attack—and this is a major attack. It is hoped that Vladimir Putin has more sense than to escalate the war to that level, for it would spell disaster and a certain World War III. So what are Putin's options—something that he has not already tried in this war that has been going on for over three years? It's likely that he will pummel Ukraine even harder, and that there will be a major loss of lives, once again. Volodymyr Zelenskyy should bear some responsibility for that.

One aspect of Ukraine's attack that riles is the timing. What pushed Zelenskyy to time it exactly the day before the scheduled peace talks in Istanbul, on Monday? Was he trying to use the attack as a bargaining chip to get concessions from Russia? But his demands have been maximalist—nothing short of the return of Crimea, lost in 2014, and the territories lost in the last three years. While Putin is clear that Russia would not concede to his demands.

There is no denying that Operation Spiderweb is an attempt by Zelenskyv to burnish his own image. Is Zelenskyy thus trying to show his "mentors" that he is not finished and that there is still a possibility that Putin could be defeated and dethroned, given that this has been the intention right from the beginning? Is the aim of the operation to ensure that more money and materiel flow in for Ukraine, now that the US under President Donald Trump has decided to turn the tap off? Also, who among the Nato members knew about and helped in this attack, by using satellites, etc., to remote control the drones from thousands of miles away? There is a buzz that the Americans were not told about the impending attack. Was it the Europeans then? Did they, as Nato members, get directly involved in Zelenskyy's operation? If yes, this brings Nato in direct conflict with Russia, which is a disaster. Surprisingly, President Trump, who cannot stop speaking of how he prevented a nuclear war from breaking out between India and Pakistan, has not uttered one word, at the time of going to print, about Ukraine's Operation Spiderweb. This is a strange silence, given that he was once personally invested in stopping the war inside 24 hours of taking office—four and a half months ago. No one seems to be listening to the American President and that is not good news for the world's number one superpower or the world. The only thing clear amidst this fog of war is that

there are several vested interests that want this war

to continue and perhaps even escalate. **JOYEETA BASU**

Cervical Cancer & HPV Vaccination: A Public Health Imperative

Even today, many of us are still unaware that cervical cancer can be prevented through vaccination. Despite the availability of the vaccine for several years, cervical cancer continues to pose a significant global public health challenge. It is primarily caused by certain high-risk strains of the Human Papillomavirus (HPV), an infection that leads to cervical cancer in women and genital warts in men. Fortunately, the risk of HPV infection can be effectively reduced through vaccination. The HPV vaccine is recommended for all girls aged 9 to 26 years. Girls under 15 years are administered two doses, while those over 15 receive three doses over a span of six months. The vaccine is specifically designed to prevent infection from high-risk HPV types, particularly HPV-16 and HPV-18, which together account for about 70% of cervical

cancer cases The invention of the HPV vaccine is a major milestone in cancer prevention. The first successful HPV vaccine was developed in the early 2000s by Professor Ian Frazer and Dr. Jian Zhou at the University of Queensland, Australia. Their groundbreaking research led to the creation of the vaccine Gardasil, which was first approved for use in 2006. This

revolutionary development has since transformed global public health strategies by offering a scientifically proven method to prevent HPV-related cancers.

Globally, cervical cancer ranks as the third most common cancer among women in terms of new cases per vear, with approximately 85% of the burden falling on less developed countries. In 2012, cervical cancer was responsible for 7.5% of all female cancer deaths worldwide, with significantly higher mortality rates reported in low-resource settings. The estimated age-standardized incidence rate was 22.9 per 100,000 women in 2012. In India, the burden is particularly alarming. According to the National Cancer Registry Programme and GLO-BOCAN 2020 estimates, India reports around 123,907 **new cases** of cervical cancer and approximately 77,348 deaths annually. It is the second most common cancer among Indian women aged 15 to 44 years. Although large-scale screening programs remain limited, urban areas have shown a notable decline in cervical cancer rates. For example, in Chennai, the age-adjusted incidence rate dropped from 42.3 in 1982–83 to 16.7 in

2010 per 100,000 women.

Vaccines such as Garda-

sil-9, which protects against nine HPV types, and the older version Gardasil, which protects against four types, are commonly used. Vaccinating both girls and boys before adolescence not only prevents the onset of cervical cancer but also helps in reducing the spread of HPV within the general population, thereby offering comcountries where vaccination coverage is high, significant declines in HPV infections and related diseases have been observed. The HPV vaccine has undergone extensive clinical testing and is approved by major health authorities, including the World Health Organization (WHO), the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), and the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA). It is considered safe and well-tolerated. Mild side effects may include soreness at the injection site, mild fever, fatigue, headache, or dizziness. Serious side effects are extremely rare, and millions of doses have been safely administered worldwide.

Given the extensive medical evidence and global health recommendations, the administration of the HPV vaccine stands as a scientifically validated and legally endorsed measure for preventing HPV-related cancers, including cervical cancer. The vaccine has gained approval from reputable health regulatory bodies such as the WHO, CDC, and FDA for use in designated population groups. In this context, it is in the best interest of public health policy-and in keeping with international obligations to uphold the Right to Health—that governments, healthcare providers, and public institutions take all necessary steps to ensure the availability, accessibility, and informed administration of

the HPV vaccine. Promot-

ing this vaccination initiative not only decreases the incidence of cervical cancer but also fulfils moral, legal, and ethical duties to protect both present and future generations

Despite these advancements, there is an urgent need to raise awareness in society regarding cervical cancer prevention and the benefits of the HPV vaccine. Many individuals, especially munity-wide protection. In in rural and underserved communities, remain unaware of the link between HPV and cervical cancer or are influenced by myths, stigma, or misinformation. Lack of knowledge among parents, adolescents, and even healthcare workers often result in missed vaccination opportunities. Social taboos associated with sexual health also hinder open discussions and education. Therefore, community-based awareness campaigns, school health programs, inclusion of cervical health education in curricula, and involvement of local influencers, including teachers, doctors, and media, are essential. Increasing awareness is not only crucial for improving vaccination uptake but also for empowering individuals to make informed health decisions and demand accessible preventive services.

> As of May 2025, numerous countries have launched or expanded their HPV vaccination programs to eliminate cervical cancer and improve public health. In October 2023, Bangladesh initiated its first nationwide HPV vaccination campaign, targeting girls aged 10 to 14. Tanzania launched a national multi-age cohort (MAC) vaccination campaign in April 2024, offering the HPV vaccine free of charge. Nigeria began its national HPV vaccination program in October 2023, adopting a single-dose schedule for girls aged 9 to 14, aiming to achieve at least 80% coverage. The United

all 12- and 13-year-olds, regardless of gender, to protect against multiple HPV-related cancers. Ireland now offers the HPV vaccine to both boys and girls and aims to eliminate cervical cancer by 2040, following Australia's model. Since July 2022, Australia has allowed women aged 25 to 74 to self-collect cervical screening samples, thereby improving access in underserved regions. In India, efforts have been intensified with the launch of the indigenous HPV vaccine "Cervavac" in March 2024. Thousands of doctors have been trained to promote its uptake, making the vaccine more accessible and afford-

At the state level, India has witnessed various proactive initiatives. Bihar launched the "Mukhyamantri Balika Cancer Pratirakshan Yojana," becoming the first state to offer the HPV vaccine free of cost. Sikkim implemented a school-based program that achieved high coverage rates. Gujarat provides the vaccine through government health programs and school drives. Andhra Pradesh offers a 90% subsidy and delivers free vaccines through government schools. States like Punjab, Karnataka, Tamil Nadu, Chhattisgarh, and Maharashtra have initiated free HPV vaccination programs for schoolgirls in specific districts, strengthening the country's collective efforts against cervical cancer.

In view of these successful examples, it is imperative that all state governments in India promote and implement free HPV vaccination programs across all government and private schools. A nationwide school-based vaccination strategy will ensure equitable access for children from all socio-economic backgrounds and close the urban-rural gap in preventive care. The inclusion of

HPV vaccination as part of the standard school health initiative will not only protect millions of girls and boys from HPV-related diseases but also lay the foundation for a future free from cervical cancer. To protect future generations and eliminate cervical

cancer, it is critical that the Government of India integrate the HPV vaccine into the Universal Immunization Programme (UIP), just as it has done with the polio vaccine. Polio eradication in India was made possible by sustained political commitment, public awareness, and free, widespread access to vaccination. A similar model is urgently needed for cervical cancer prevention. Incorporating the HPV vaccine into the national immunization schedule would guarantee that all eligible children - regardless of their socio-economic or geographic background - receive protection early in life, well before exposure to the virus.

This move would also normalize the vaccine, reducing stigma around its administration and ensuring it is seen as a routine part of childhood immunization. It would significantly reduce future cancer-related health burdens, lower treatment costs, and align with global commitments to eliminate cervical cancer as a public health problem. Institutionalizing the HPV vaccine within India's medical policy will be a bold and necessary step toward safeguarding the health of future generations, just as the country successfully did with polio, measles, and tuberculosis.

On Monday, Kolkata resident Prasun Maitra filed a formal complaint against Rashidi for two posts on the social media platform X, which he said, hurt the religious sentiments of Hindus.

Maitra, who emailed his complaint to Kolkata Police Commissioner Manoj Kumar Verma and other top officers, also attached screenshots of Rashidi's

"Your recent activism shows that you are very much against such communally instigating posts and determined to enforce the rule of law. In view of the above, you are requested to initiate appropriate legal action against the person, described above, in line with your recent activities and as per law of the land so that your integrity doesn't come under any question," said Maitra in

his complaint. Maitra followed up on his complaint several hours

later, noting that the police were yet to register a first information report (FIR) on the basis of his complaint. Harikrishna Pai, Deputy Commissioner of Police (Port) said Maitra's complaint will be looked into and action taken according to law.

"Whatever complaint we get, we will definitely take legal action. He (Maitra) has sent his complaint to several officers," Pai said.

A BJP leader told The Daily Guardian: "Despite such overwhelming evidence against Wazahat Khan, aimed at disturbing communal harmony and creating enmity between two religions, no action has been taken by the Kolkata Police against him though who resides in Kolkata. Kolkata Police could travel 1500 km to arrest a 22-vear-old Hindu girl but failed to nab Kolkata-based Wazahat Khan."

Suvendu Adhikari, the BJP's Leader of the Opposition, said: "The action is only taken against Sanatanis. In Mamata Banerjee's rule, everyone here has a licence to abuse Sanatan Dharma...This is appeasement politics," he said.

On Monday, Delhi-based advocate Vineet Jindal, also

filed an official complaint with the Delhi Police and Cyber Crime Unit against Wajahat Khan, accusing him of online hate speech, religious defamation, and abusive content under the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS) and the IT Act, though it has not yet been registered as a case/FIR.

When many social media users criticised Panoli's arrest, the Kolkata Police defended its action on X on Sunday.

In a post, Kolkata Police said some social media accounts were spreading false information that it had unlawfully arrested a law student for opposing Pakistan. "This narrative is mischievous and misleading.

Expressing national pride and patriotism is a thing that every citizen and organisation stands for. Kolkata Police being no different, stands firmly with the citizens of India," the post said.

It added that the Panoli case was registered "on the basis of allegations that she posted a video which was insulting to the religious beliefs of a class of citizens of India and amounted to promoting disharmony and hatred between different communities. "The case was registered under appropriate sections of Bhartiya Nyaya Sanhita. The case was duly investigated and, adhering to legal procedures, several attempts were made to serve notice u/s 35 of BNSS to the accused but every time she was found absconding,' the Kolkata Police said.

"Kolkata Police acted lawfully according to the procedure established by law. The accused was not arrested for expressing patriotism or for personal belief; legal actions were taken for sharing offensive content which promotes hatred among the communities," it added.

INDIA, PARAGUAY STAND UNITED **AGAINST TERRORISM: PM MODI**

ndia and Paraguay stand united in the fight against terrorism and there is immense possibility to work unitedly to combat shared challenges such as cybercrime and drug trafficking, Prime Minister Narendra Modi said on Monday.

Modi made the remarks at delegation-level talks with Paraguayan President Santiago Pena Palacios. The Pahalgam terror attack figured in the talks.

Pena arrived in Delhi this morning on a three-day visit to India to explore ways to expand overall cooperation.

It is his first visit to India and only the second trip by a president of the South American country.

Paraguay is an important trading partner for India in the Latin American region. Several Indian companies in the automobile and pharmaceutical sectors have their presence in Paraguay.

Modi expressed his deep appreciation for Paraguay for its strong condemnation of the terrorist attack in Pahalgam, as well as for the sincere condolences and solidarity expressed with the people of India, P Kumaran, Secretary (East)



Prime Minister Narendra Modi meets President of Paraguay,

in the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA), said at a media briefing.

Both leaders "unequivocally" condemned terrorism and violent extremism in all its forms, he said.

On behalf of the Paraguayan people, President Pena expressed his deep solidarity with the victims of the terrorist attack and their families, he added.

Kumaran said President

Santiago Pena, at Hyderabad House in New Delhi. ANI Pena made it clear that he would be looking at India as a big trade and investment partner, and invited Indian companies to invest

> in Paraguay. Modi and Pena held a comprehensive discussion on the entire spectrum of ties including trade and investment, defence and security, infrastructure, mining and mineral resources, agriculture and food security,

In his remarks at the talks,

Modi said, "We see new opportunities for cooperation in areas such as digital technology, critical minerals, energy, agriculture, healthcare, defence, railways, space and overall economic partnership."

The prime minister also referred to New Delhi's preferential trade arrangement with South American trading bloc MERCOSUR.

"We can work together to further expand it," he said. MERCOSUR or Common Market of the South is a trading bloc comprising Argentina, Brazil, Paraguay, and Uruguay.

The two leaders also deliberated on ways to combat terrorism against the backdrop of the Pahalgam terror attack.

"India and Paraguay stand united in the fight against terrorism. There is immense possibility of cooperation to fight against shared challenges such as cybercrime, organised crime and drug

trafficking," Modi said. The prime minister described Paraguay as an integral part of the Global South. "India and Paraguay are integral parts of the Global South. Our hopes,

aspirations and challenges are similar. And this is why we can learn from each other's experiences to deal with these challenges effectively," he said.

"We are pleased that India could extend support to Paraguay by sharing its vaccines during the COVID pandemic. We look forward to continuing this spirit of cooperation by sharing more of our capabilities," he said.

Modi and Pena welcomed the establishment of a Joint Commission Mechanism (JCM) that will serve as a key platform to review and advance cooperation in priority areas of mutual interest. India and Paraguay established diplomatic relations on 13 September 1961, cultivating warm and friendly ties between the two nations.

Both countries have since developed cooperation in various sectors, including trade, agriculture, health, pharmaceuticals and information technology.

The two countries share common views on various international issues, including UN reforms, climate change, renewable energy and combating terrorism, according to the MEA

Khurshid sparks row with patriotic post amid Congress internal criticism

Senior Congress leader Salman Khurshid, part of the all-party delegation briefing on Operation Sindoor, stirred controversy on Monday with a cryptic post questioning those calculating political allegiances, asking, "Is it so difficult to be patriotic?"

Khurshid's post came shortly after fellow party leader Shashi Tharoor faced internal criticism for his views on surgical strikes.

Notably, Khurshid had earlier praised the abrogation of Article 370 in Jammu and Kashmir.

In a post on X (formerly Twitter), Khurshid wrote, "When on mission against terrorism, to carry India's message to the world, it's distressing that people at home are calculating political allegiances. Is it so difficult to be patriotic?"

He did not name any party leaders or specify which party he was referring to.

Khurshid's remarks on Article 370 during his visit have further deepened unease within the Congress party.

The former foreign minister is currently in East Asia as part of an all-party parliamentary delegation led by

JD(U) MP Sanjay Kumar Jha. While addressing think tanks and academic forums in Indonesia last week, Khurshid said it was unfortunate that Pakistan wants to undo the prosperity that has come

to Jammu and Kashmir fol-

lowing the abrogation of Ar-

ticle 370. This stance contrasts with Congress's earlier position, which strongly opposed the NDA government's move to revoke Article 370 in 2019.

Heavy rain lashes Mumbai, IMD predicts occasional light spells

Mumbai city received heavy rainfall on Monday. Rain lashed several parts of the city. The India Meteorological Department IMD earlier today predicted a partly cloudy sky with the possibility of occasional light spells of rain in the city and suburbs for today.

The IMD said that maximum and minimum temperatures are likely to be around 33 degrees Celsius and 26 degrees Celsius.

Earlier, on May 28, Mumbai city received heavy rainfall. The IMD said that quantitatively, the southwest monsoon seasonal rainfall over the country as a whole is likely to be 106 percent of the Long Period Average (LPA) with a model error of +-4 percent, indicating



that above normal rainfall is most likely over the country as a whole during the monsoon season (June to September), 2025.

"The southwest monsoon seasonal (June to September, 2025) rainfall is most likely to be above normal over Central India and South Peninsular India (>106% of LPA), normal over Northwest India (92-108% of LPA) and below normal over Northeast India (<94% of LPA)," the

IMD said in a press release. The southwest monsoon seasonal rainfall over the Monsoon Core Zone (MCZ) consisting of most of the rainfed agriculture areas in the country is most likely to be above normal (>106% of LPA). During June to September 2025, normal to above normal rainfall is very likely over most parts of the country except some areas of Northwest and East India, and many areas of North-

east India where below

normal rainfall is very likely. Earlier, the national capital on Sunday witnessed a spell of rain, accompanied by strong winds over the southern parts of Delhi. The rains are due to an east-southeastward-

moving cloud cluster, according to the Meteorological Department. The spell of rain offered a much-needed respite from the heat, as the national capital recorded maximum temperatures of more than 39 C earlier in the morning.

According to IMD, Safdarjung area recorded a maximum temperature of 39.7 degrees Celsius, Ayanagar 39.5 degrees Celsius, Lodhi Road 39.4 degrees Celsius and Palam recorded 39.1 degrees Celsius. The IMD has issued warnings of thunderstorms, lightning and squall for the next two days, on June 2-3, in the national

Andhra: YSRCP leader condemns scrapping of doorstep delivery of ration

PUNJAB APPROVES NEW LAND POOLING POLICY: 400% RETURN FOR FARMERS, RS 30,000/ACRE AID, PLOTS WITH FULL

AMENITIES IN 27 CITIES

Move aimed at curbing illegal colonisation, empowering farmers, and promoting planned development across 27 cities

n a significant development aimed at streamlining urban expansion and tackling the menace of illegal colonies, the Punjab Cabinet on Monday approved a new Land Pooling Policy. The policy, described as a voluntary and participatory model, seeks to include landowners as stakeholders in the state's planned growth initiatives while ensuring safeguards against coercion or exploitation.

The policy was approved during a meeting of the Council of Ministers held at Chief Minister Bhagwant Singh Mann's official residence. With this move, the government aims to reverse decades of unregulated construction and unchecked colonisation, particularly in urban fringes and peri-urban areas.

VOLUNTARY PARTICIPATION EMPHASISED

Punjab Renewable Energy Minister Aman Arora clarified that the scheme is completely voluntary. "There is no force, no pressure. The farmer has complete authority. Nothing will happen without their written consent," he stated.

The policy will be launched in 27 selected cities in its first phase, where have been most prevalent. Landowners in these areas can now opt to pool their land with the government. They can also continue farming, sell their land, or develop it independently if they so choose.

WHAT FARMERS WILL GET?

Under this land pooling scheme, for every one acre of land pooled with the government, the farmer will receive a 1,000-squarevard residential plot and a 200-square-yard commercial plot.

The government will undertake full infrastructure development on the returned plots, including the construction of roads, water supply, sewerage,

Until the final plots are ready and handed over, the landowners will receive annual compensation of Rs 30,000 per acre, for a maximum of three years.

Each landowner will receive an entitlement certificate detailing the plots they will get in return. The beneficiaries will also have the unauthorised colonies and option to choose between unregulated development two 500-square-vard plots or other configurations, based on policy guidelines. The returned plots, once developed, are expected to around land exploitation

A consortium of farmers pooling 50 acres will collectively get 30 acres of developed land in return.

This model of proportionate return based on larger contributions aims to encourage cooperative participation among landowners while facilitating larger development projects.


