Trump ally Kirk shot dead at US university

Right-wing political commentator and conservative activist Charlie Kirk was shot dead on Wednesday while delivering a speech at Utah Valley University, according to The New York

A university spokesperson stated that Kirk was about 20 minutes into his presentation when a gunshot was heard from a nearby building. The university issued an alert informing students that "a single shot was fired on campus toward a visiting speaker," and confirmed that a suspect has been taken into custody.

Later US President Donald Trump announced on social media that conservative activist Charlie Kirk has died after he was shot in the neck while speaking at a Utah Valley University event. Punjab families protest recruitment of youths into Russian Army

Families of several Indian youths, mostly from Punjab, have expressed anger and despair after reports surfaced that young men from the state were being recruited into the Russian army to fight in the ongoing war against Ukraine.

Despite repeated requests from New Delhi urging Moscow to stop such recruitment, at least 15 Puniabi youths are believed to have been drawn into the conflict. Some of them have gone missing, while others are reportedly stranded in Russia.

Jagdeep Singh, whose brother Mandeep is among those untraceable, said the families had been left helpless. "Since July this year, these recruitments have taken place, and the stranded youths have been making frantic calls to the Indian embassy in Russia, but there

Farooq barred from meeting Singh, calls it 'assault on democracy'

High drama unfolded at the Circuit House here on Thursday after National Conference president and former J&K chief minister Farooq Abdullah was stopped by police from meeting AAP MP Sanjay Singh, who was detained inside the premises to prevent him from protesting against the PSA detention of party MLA Mehraj Malik.

Separated by a locked gate, the two leaders exchanged words with police personnel in full public view. A visibly upset Abdullah called the action a "direct assault" on constitutional values.

"This is the situation here an elected government in place, but it looks like the strings are being operated by the Lieutenant Governor," Abdullah told reporters, accusing the administration of abusing its authority.

Tearly two years after ethnic violence pur, Prime Minister Narendra Modi is scheduled to visit the state on September 13 and unveil projects valued at Rs 8,500 crore, officials said on Thursday.

Opposition parties have been criticising the Prime Minister for not visiting the northeastern state, where clashes between Kuki and Meitei communities have left over 260 people dead and thousands homeless since May 2023.

According to officials, Modi will lay foundation stones for various development projects valued at Rs 7,300 crore from Peace Ground in Churachandpur where Kukis are in the majority.

The Prime Minister will also inaugurate infrastructure projects worth Rs 1,200 crore from the state capital Imphal dominated by the Meiteis, they said.

It was being speculated for the past few days that Modi would club his official visit to neighbouring Mizoram with one in Manipur, but no

Gadkari pitches for additional discount to vehicle buyers submitting scrappage certificate

NEW DELHI Union Minister Nitin Gadkari on Thursday urged the automobile industry to consider offering additional discounts to customers who submit a scrappage certificate while buying a new vehicle.The Road Transport and Highway Minister also said that he has requested Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman to give GST relief to those buying a

new vehicle after scrapping their old vehicle.

The minister also hit back at the campaign against the E20 fuel (20 per cent ethanol blended petrol), saying the campaign was politically motivated against him.

"This social media campaign was a paid campaign. It was against ethanol, and it was to target me politically," he said, speaking here at the annual convention of the Society of Indian Automobile Manufacturers (SIAM).

Opposition Congress recently levelled conflict of interest allegations against Gadkari, claiming that he has been "aggressively lobbying" for ethanol production while his two sons are involved in firms that produce ethanol and "benefited" from the government On the vehicle scrappage

policy, Gadkari said it was a "win-win" for both industry and the government, as this could help the private sector



also with the availability of scrap metals, which are im-

The automobile industry is "still not fully listening to me" on this, the minister said, adding that it is for the benefit of the industry.

"If you will give some discount to those who will scrap the vehicle, to buy a new vehicle, then your turnover will increase a lot," he said, adding, "The government will also get GST. And the pollution of the country will be reduced. So you should definitely contribute to this."

The minister asked the industry to consider offering "good discounts" to those buying a new vehicle after submitting a scrap certificate of the old vehicle.

He said that at present, an average of 16,830 vehicles are being scrapped monthly, and the private sector has invested Rs 2,700 crore.

"The steel scrap that we import into our country is 60 lakh tonnes. And apart from this, the very important metals, due to which there is a shortage, which you have to bring from outside, can also get from scrapping," he said.Gadkari added that only 6 per cent of aluminium has been made available through imports.

"If all vehicles are scrapped, then through GST, the new additional vehicles that people will buy will benefit the state governments and the Indian government by Rs 40,000 crore," he said.

The automobile industry will also benefit from the additional demand which will be created after scrapping.

"So, looking at both these win-win situations, if you support the scrapping certificate in some of the incentives, then I think it will take our country and this industry forward, and your production cost will be reduced," he said.

Yamuna water level drops

The water level of the Yamuna River has fallen below the danger mark, bringing relief for people living in low-lying areas of Delhi.

Visuals from the ITO Chhath Ghat and Loha Pul showed the river flowing below 205 meters on Thursday morning.

Earlier on Wednesday, the river had remained close to the danger mark in the early hours, raising concerns among residents and authorities.

The danger level for the Yamuna in the city is 205.33 metres, while the warning level is 204.5 metres. Evacuations are generally initiated when the level reaches 206 metres.

In Agra, the water level of the Yamuna River around the Taj Mahal area rose significantly on Tuesday following heavy rainfall in the region.

CISF expands mental health support for personnel

The Central Industrial Security Force (CISF) on Wednesday renewed its partnership with Mpower, a mental health initiative of the Aditya Birla Education Trust (ABET), by extending the Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) for another three years.

The extension builds on the success of Project Mann, launched in November 2024, which has provided structured mental health support to CISF personnel and their families. Over the past year, more than 75,000 beneficiaries have availed professional services under the program, contributing to a decline in suicide rates within the force-now reported to be below the national average.

The renewed MoU was signed by Parveen Sheikh, President, Mpower, and Sudha Senthil, Vice President, Sanrakshika, Currently, 23 counselors and clinical psychologists serve across 13 CISF sectors. With the new agreement,



the number will rise to 30, and services will expand to eight additional cities including Patna, Ahmedabad, Prayagraj, Bhopal/Indore, Jammu, Chandigarh, Jaipur, and Cochin.

The initiative has been credited with reducing stigma around mental health, encouraging early help-seeking behavior, and improving emotional resilience among personnel. It has also helped cut absenteeism, burnout, and longterm psychological stress.

Highlighting the importance of the program, CISF Director General R.S. Bhatti said, "The well-being of our personnel is paramount to maintaining operational excellence.

INDIA'S WHOLESALE INFLATION LIKELY TURN POSITIVE IN AUGUST, SAYS UBI

WPI rebounded in August after two months of contraction.

Tholesale inflation in India likely turned positive in August 2025, rising to 0.45 per cent yearon-year after recording a contraction of -0.58 per cent in July, according to a report by Union Bank of India (UBI).

The report highlighted that the Wholesale Price Index (WPI) bounced back after touching a recent low in July, supported by broadbased gains across food, fuel, and core segments.

The shift also reflected the fading impact of a high base, with WPI at 1.25 per cent in August 2024 compared to 2.10 per cent in July 2024.

The report stated, "Wholesale Price Index (WPI), in our opinion, turned positive in August'25 after making a recent low of -0.58 per cent in July'25"

The report expected that the food inflation, which had been in deflation for the past two months, returned

GST reforms to boost

has taken a significant step to boost the automobile industry through rationalisation of GST rates across various vehicle categories and com-

An analysis by the Press Information Bureau (PIB) added that the move aligns with broader policy objectives under flagship initiatives like Make in India, Production Linked Incentive (PLI) schemes, and the National Logistics Policy, all aimed at strengthening domestic manufacturing, modernising infrastructure, and encouraging innovation.

The new GST rate cuts cover a wide range of vehicles including two-wheelers (up to 35Occ), buses, small to luxury cars, tractors (under 1800cc), and auto parts. By lowering taxes, the government aims to make vehicles more affordable, thereby stimulating demand and supporting manufacturers and ancillary industries such as tyres, batteries, glass, steel, plastics, and electronics.

This increase in vehicle sales is expected to create a multiplier effect, benefiting

micro, small, and medium enterprises (MSMEs) throughout the supply chain.

India's automobile sector supports over 3.5 crore jobs directly and indirectly, spanning manufacturing, sales, financing, and maintenance.

The GST cuts will boost employment not only in formal sectors like dealerships, logistics, and financing but also in informal segments such as drivers, mechanics, and small garages.

Additionally, with more credit-driven vehicle purchases anticipated, retail loan growth is expected to rise, improving asset quality and driving financial inclusion in semi-urban India.

Focusing on specific vehicle segments, the GST reduction on two-wheelers from 28 per cent to 18 per cent will lower prices for bikes, benefiting youth, professionals, farmers, and gig workers by reducing costs and EMIs. Similarly, small cars in the affordable segment will become more accessible, especially in smaller towns where these vehicles dominate.

The GST cut on large cars simplifies taxation by removing the additional cess, making them more affordable while providing full input tax credit (ITC) benefits.

Tractors and commercial goods vehicles (CGVs) also see significant rate reductions, with tractors under 1800cc dropping from 12 per cent to 5 per cent, and CGVs from 28 per cent to 18 per cent.

Hospitals to boost IT spending

IT innovation budgets in Indian hospitals are set to rise by 20-25 per cent over the next 2-3 years, with nearly half of healthcare providers already allocating 20-50 per cent of their spends to digital innovation, reveals the Confederation of Indian Industry (CII)- EY Health-Tech Survey 2025.

The report, launched at the CII Hospital Tech 2025 Summit, highlights how automation in patient experience, clinical outcomes, and data-driven decision making is taking center stage.

Titled "Unleashing digital momentum to shape the future of healthcare - enabling automation to enforcing transformation", the report also flags the barriers of legacy systems, workforce readiness, and patient-centric delivery that hospitals must overcome to become

When it comes to prioritizing digital investments, healthcare providers are directing budgets where they see long-term capability gains. Six in ten hospitals plan to invest in IT capability building, followed by BI tools and data lakes (50 per cent). Hardware upgrades and critical application enhancements fall lower on the priority list (10 per cent), while medium-priority areas include data management and cybersecurity.

Healthcare providers are also leaning into AI with a clear focus on enhancing

visibility of clinical data and generating meaningful insights to assist doctors.

Top priorities include AI for clinical documentation and data analysis (72 per cent), decision support systems (64 per cent) and imaging (60 per cent).

This reflects a pra approach where CIOs are choosing to invest in highimpact applications that enhance data visibility for clinicians, providers and patients, strengthen everyday clinical decisionmaking thereby improving

GST reform: Fiscal target still achievable

India is likely to meet its fiscal deficit target of 4.4 per cent of GDP in FY26 despite anticipated revenue loss from the implementation of GST 2.0, according to a report by CareEdge Ratings.

The report noted that while the rationalisation of GST is expected to result in a revenue shortfall, the government's fiscal consolidation path remains achievable. CareEdge projected that the fiscal deficit for FY26 will be contained at the budgeted level of 4.4 per cent of GDP.

As per the report, the rationalisation of GST has been estimated to cause a net revenue shortfall of around 0.1 per cent of GDP for the current fiscal year. However, the report high-

lighted that this shortfall is

expected to be cushioned by the higher dividend transfer from the Reserve Bank of India (RBI). The higher inflow from the central bank is likely to provide crucial support to government finances at a time when tax collections face pressure. It stated "We expect the net revenue shortfall from GST rationalization..... to be cushioned by the higher RBI dividend transfer".

The report noted that higher RBI dividend transfers and the government's focus on expenditure management will play a key role in keeping the deficit within the budgeted limits.

The report also said that while GST rationalisation could reduce collections in the short term, it is expected to improve the buoyancy of tax revenues in the medium

NEPAL CRISIS: A RESULT OF FAILURE OF GOVERNANCE, CORRUPTION, AND VIOLATION OF RIGHTS

he recent political and social turmoil in Nepal is not merely a consequence of public discontent; it is a human tragedy born from broken promises. What started as frustration over a government ban on social media has quickly spiraled into a national cry for justice a movement that's challenging the very foundations of accountability and citizens' rights.

Nepal's transition to a federal democratic republic in 2015 was supposed to be a new dawn, promising justice and freedom for all. But years of political infighting, frequent shifts in power, and a gaping void in leadership have left people feeling betrayed. The current crisis isn't a sudden event; it's the inevitable result of letting fundamental problems fester for far too long.

The constitutional promise of stability has been shattered by a constant cycle of political chaos. Since the monarchy's abolition in 2008, Nepal has had over a dozen governments, with administrations averaging just over a year in power. This is more than just political instability: it's a profound failure of governance. The frequent changes have prevented long-term policy implementation, stalled critical infrastructure projects, and

created a bureaucratic inertia that has stifled economic progress. For example, key initiatives like the Nijgadh International Airport have languished in bureaucratic limbo, costing the country valuable time and resources. This political churn has led many citizens, particularly the youth, to question whether the democratic system they fought for is truly working for them.

temic corruption. We've all seen the stories: public funds being mismanaged, contracts for big projects mysteriously stalling, and government officials living lavishly while millions struggle. It's a constant slap in the face and a violation of the Civil Service Act, 1993 and the Public Procurement Act, 2063(2007), which mandate transparency, accountability, and ethical conduct for government officials. The discontent has been amplified by a series of high-profile scandals that have made headlines and gone viral on social media. One of the most egregious examples is the Bhutanese refugee scam, where government officials were allegedly involved in a scheme to illegally sell "refugee" status to Nepalis seeking to go abroad, essentially turning a humanitarian issue into

a corrupt money-making enterprise. There have also been allegations of embezzlement related to the Pokhara airport and other development projects. You see it in the images and videos that circulate online of politicians' families living extravagant lives. It's not hard to understand why people get so angry. When they see their leaders benefiting from a broken system, while they're left with rising costs and no jobs, it feels personal. And instead of addressing this anger, the government tried to shut down the very platforms where people were speaking out. It was a counterproductive move that backfired spectacularly. At its heart, this crisis is about whether the government respects the basic rights guaranteed to its own people. Nepal's Constitution protects freedom of expression, privacy, and equality through Article 17 (freedom of opinion and expression), Article 28 (right to privacy), and Article 18 (equality before the law). By imposing a blanket ban on social media, the government has directly trampled on these protections. The government's legal justification for the ban that platforms like Facebook and YouTube failed to register locally is widely seen as a flimsy pretext for censorship. The move effectively crippled a digital ecosystem that has become a primary channel for edu-

ment to protect freedom of expression and assembly. Reports from human rights groups and journalists document police using tear gas, rubber bullets, and even live rounds against peaceful crowds. With at least 19 people killed and hundreds injured, the government's response has not only deepened public mistrust but has also fueled the unrest. The current crisis in Nepal isn't an isolated event. It's part of a worrying pattern across South Asia. We saw it in Sri Lanka in 2022, where an economic collapse led to mass protests that toppled a government. Then again in Bangladesh demonstrations against job quotas quickly escalated into a wider movement that forced a leader to flee. In each case, a proximate trigger an economic collapse, a job policy, a social media ban lit a fuse for deeper, long-simmering discontent over corruption and a lack of accountability. These youth-led movements are sending a powerful message to their governments: they won't tolerate a state that serves itself at the expense of its people. International human rights bodies have also criticized the government's actions, urging Nepal to restore communication freedoms and engage in meaningful dialogue with citizens. Nepal's

leaders now have a choice: continue with heavyhanded policies that will only cause more division, or start to rebuild trust through genuine dialogue and transparency. Restoring stability will take more than just political speeches. It will require lifting these restrictions, conducting independent investigations into corruption scandals, and ensuring our state institutions work for the people—not for a select few.

The crisis in Nepal is a stark, undeniable example of what happens when corruption and a blatant disregard for fundamental rights take over. It's a clear and powerful testament to how a vacuum in leadership can lead to national in-

stability. For other nations, the events in Nepal offer a crucial lesson: true stability isn't built by silencing people but on a foundation of transparent governance and the unwavering protection of civil liberties. The youth-led movement here isn't just about frustration; it is a beacon of hope for a rights-driven society. The choices made today will not only determine Nepal's future but will be watched closely by others, serving as either a cautionary tale or a model for democratic

Peace through Arsenal: A hopeless hope

The most disadvantageous peace is better than the most just war.

-Desiderius Erasmus However, the most popular notion of peace is the absence of violence or war. This is the primary dictionary definition, which leads to a perspective: since there cannot be a universe agreeable to a universal notion of peace, 'others' can be deterred only from waging war, and this deterrence can be achieved only if 'we' become more powerful than they. We must have a huge arsenal of weapons that can instill fear in the 'other'. The understanding that the arsenal of weapons alone can bring in and maintain peace is one that leads to 9/11 and 26/11 attacks, suggesting that these, in the long run, would either establish peace or at least deter the 'other'.

The world's vast arsenal of Weapons of Mass Destruction (WMDs) paints a troubling picture of a planet more prepared for conflict than for peace. This reality is deeply connected to the legacy of the 9/11 attacks and the simultaneous rise of nationalist violence across the globe, creating a self-perpetuating cycle of fear, militarization, and insecurity. Updated data from the Federation of American Scientists (FAS) in June 2025 reveals that nine countries together hold approximately 12,241 nuclear warheads. Of these, nearly 9,614 are maintained in active military stockpiles, ready to be deployed by missiles, submarines, ships, and aircraft. The overwhelming majority of this destructive capability rests with just two nations-Russia and the United States—who collectively control about 87 percent of the total inventory and 83 percent of the stockpiled warheads available for immediate military use. Other nuclear-armed states, including China, France, the United Kingdom, India, Pakistan, Israel, and North Korea, maintain far smaller but still significant stockpiles, with India's arsenal increasing from 172

warheads in 2024 to 180

in 2025, reflecting a steady

modernization of its deterrent force.

The vast scale of these arsenals exists in a world whose security priorities were profoundly reshaped by the 9/11 attacks. That event shifted global thinking away from traditional state-centered conflicts and toward the alarming possibility of non-state actors obtaining WMDs. India has long criticized the **Nuclear Non-Proliferation** Treaty (NPT) for failing to address this risk, noting the emergence of terrorist groups that openly seek access to nuclear materials as well as the exposure of a global black market in nuclear technology. What had once been a theoretical concern became, after 9/11, a central driver of security policy. The fear that terrorist networks could acquire nuclear weapons or biological agents—similar to the plague-infected fleas used by Japan's Unit 731 during World War II-justified pre-emptive wars, sweeping surveillance programs, and global campaigns to secure fissile materials. Ironically, this same fear reinforced the belief that large state arsenals were necessary as ultimate deterrents against stateless threats.

While 9/11 reshaped the rationale behind WMD strategies, it is the resurgence of nationalism that is now shaping who arms themselves and how much



vides the most direct example: as a result of Russia's war of aggression, Ukraine became the world's largest importer of major arms between 2020 and 2024, while overall European arms imports increased by 155 percent in the same period. In South Asia, the nearly identical nuclear stockpiles of India and Pakistan highlight how nuclear weapons have become symbols of sovereignty and national security, leaving little room for meaningful disarmament. Nationalism also plays out domestically; for instance, the United States, second only to Yemen in allowing firearm ownership

ist ethos that resists government oversight—mirroring the resistance of states to binding international arms

In this fractured landscape, India's position stands out as both principled and pragmatic. Having ratified the Biological Weapons Convention in 1974 and the Chemical Weapons Convention in 1996, India has consistently opposed the use of such indiscriminate weapons. The same year it ratified the BWC, India conducted its first nuclear test, "Smiling Buddha," reflecting its commitment to global disarmament and its pursuit of strategic security. India,

sign the NPT or the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons (TPNW), arguing that both treaties are discriminatory. Its critique is threefold: the failure of nuclear powers to pursue genuine disarmament, the creation of permanent divisions between nuclear "haves" and "havenots," and the imposition of intrusive safeguards on non-nuclear states while nuclear-armed states enjoy voluntary measures. Regarding the TPNW, India has made it clear that it does not consider the treaty binding, maintaining instead that only a universal and non-discriminatory

framework can achieve

true disarmament. Yet, such a framework appears increasingly unattainable in a world fractured by na-

tionalism. The global situation thus reveals a dangerous feedback loop. Nationalist conflicts, such as the war in Ukraine, create profound insecurity. That insecurity drives both conventional and nuclear arms races, as seen in Europe's surge in imports and the India-Pakistan nuclear rivalry. The proliferation of these weapons intensifies fears that they may eventually fall into the hands of nonstate actors, a haunting lesson of the 9/11 era. These fears, in turn, justify further militarization and the maintenance of massive WMD stockpiles, which only worsen nationalist rivalries and global divisions. The 12,241 nuclear warheads in existence today are not mere statistics; they represent a world caught between the legacies of terrorism and nationalism, where the most destructive tools ever created remain deeply embedded in the identity and security calculations of the modern nation-state.

In such a scenario, imagining or re-imagining that these weapons will bring peace will be more than illusory. The most destructive weapons will somehow bring and maintain peace is an argument that neither Oppenheimer nor Gandhi can believe. Nuclear deterrence can prevent possible conflict or war is not a proven historical argument. The question that 'security for who?' and from 'whom' persists; the question of peace and war should be studied from a different vantage point than from a Western-CIS-hetero, gender exclusive stance. The battle for a world free from nuclear weapons or any weapons begins with internalising peace as a value, and then only this ideal can be achieved and sustained.

'n many Indian forests, a peculiar form of property right exists: the land may be state-owned, but certain trees on that land are **custom**arily "owned" by local tribal families or communities. Under this traditional system, individuals or clans hold rights to specific trees - for fruits, flowers, resin, or other products - even though they have no title to the soil. For example, in the forests of Bastar (Central India), the Teta family "owns" five mahua trees on public land, a privilege allotted to their ancestors generations ago. These tree rights are heritable and exclusive: each tree "belongs" to a particular family, and others generally do not harvest its produce without permission. This separation of tree and land ownership raises intriguing questions about the nature of such rights, the rules that govern them, groves or clan trees). and how they have evolved Despite their **socio-cultural** and ecological significance, scholarly attention to these customary tree tenure systems has been limited. To understand how these practices came to coexist with modern laws, one must trace their historical roots, the disruptions of colonial rule, and the gradual recognition (or omission) of these rights in contemporary legal frame-

CULTURAL TRADITIONS OF TREE TENURE

works.

Across indigenous communities of India, trees have long been entwined with social identity, livelihood, and spirituality. Many tribal societies evolved elaborate customary norms determining who may use which trees' products. These norms often differ fundamentally

 ${\bf ownership}\,\text{--}\, the\, tree\, belongs$ to the person or family that planted or nurtured it. In others, rights are claimed by first use: among certain Central Indian tribes, for instance, the first person to tap a wild resintree for gumgains a customary claim over that tree thereafter (a practice documented by recent researchers). Trees can thus be treated as **inherited property**, even though the land is communal or government-owned. Local customs govern how tree rights are created, inherited, exchanged, or shared within the community. Anthropologists have observed that customary tree tenure takes various forms – some trees are held by individuals or households, some are **jointly owned** by extended families, and others are regarded as **collective village property** (such as sacred

The cultural meaning attached to these trees reinforces their tenure. For many tribes, certain trees are revered as life-givers and ancestors. The Gond people of central India, for example, tell of their first ancestor being born under a *mahua* tree. Not surprisingly, *mahua* is considered a "tree of life" - its flowers and seeds are crucial for food, drink, and medicine, and it features in rituals and songs. Such trees are **never** felled casually; as one account notes, "a mahua tree is never chopped down but passed on to the next generation", reflecting the deep time depth of these ownership claims. Customary rules often forbid cutting or harming productive trees, focusing instead on **sustainable** harvesting of fruits, flowers, leaves or gum to ensure the resource endures. In some Northeastern tribes, certain fruit trees or bamboo clumps

ship. In some communities, planting a tree establishes

councils or elders often adjudicate disputes - for example, if a tree's ownership is contested or if branches spread into another's domain. Norms govern **inheritance** (tree rights typically pass to sons or daughters, or may be part of dowry in some cultures), as well as management duties (the owning family must care for the tree, perform rituals, prevent over-exploitation, etc.). Such practices foster community cohesion and link people to specific trees through generations. Recent research in Jharkhand finds that these traditions can strengthen familial ties and even increase economically valuable tree species in village commons. In short, customary tree ownership goes beyond mere possession it embodies social relations, spiritual values, and conservation ethics. As Fortmann (1985) observed and later studies affirm, tree tenure is often distinct from land tenure, influenced by factors like kinship, religion, gender, and ecological knowledge.

The advent of British colonial governance in the 19th century marked a turning point for forest ownership in the subcontinent. Colonial authorities were primarily interested in timber and revenue, and they systematically asserted state control over forests, largely disregarding indigenous tenure systems. The Indian Forest Acts of 1878 and 1927 vested ownership of forest land (and by extension all trees on it) in the government, nullifying or restricting local rights. Under the 1927 Act, forests were classified as Reserved or Protected, and traditional use of trees became a statesanctioned privilege rather than a right. This legal regime made no provision for the concept of a community or individual "owning" trees on public forest land - the law simply did not recognize separate tree tenure, leaving the question "Who owns the trees?"unanswered in formal terms. All timber, fruits, and other forest produce were ostensibly the property of the Crown, except for limited usufruct rights (e.g. to collect dead wood or minor produce) that could be granted or taken

away by officials. The impact on tribal communities was profound. Customary tree rights were often criminalized or curtailed. Practices like shifting cultivation, orchard tending in forests, or tapping

banned or taxed. In Central India, the British reservation of forests directly interfered with the collection of staple foods and forest brews. Archival records and oral histories from Bastar (in today's Chhattisgarh) reveal that the 1905 proposal to reserve two-thirds of Bastar's forests and ban traditional usage ignited deep resent**ment.** Local people saw it as a violation of their "inalienable right" to the forest's bounty. By 1910, this anger exploded into the Bhumkal Rebellion of Bastar – a tribal uprising in which mango leaves and mahua flowers (symbols of the forest) were circulated as calls to revolt. The revolt, led by figures like Gunda Dhur, specifically protested the loss of customary forest access. British reports noted that **tribals were enraged** by policies like the reservation of forests and the monopoly on liquor that outlawed home-brewing of mahua, considered a sacred gift of the gods. Indeed, colonial excise rules prohibiting indigenous brewing of mahua liquor struck at a religious and economic lifeline, intensifying the backlash.

Smaller acts of resistance and adaptation occurred throughout forest communities under colonial rule. Some groups sought to secretly maintain their **tree claims** – for instance, by surreptitiously tapping resin or collecting fruit at night to avoid forest guards. Others petitioned authorities for concessions. The British did introduce the concept of nistar (limited concession for villagers to take specified forest produce for subsistence), but these were a far cry from recognizing customary ownership. Essentially, colonial forestry treated forests as state property to be managed for timber extraction or revenue, with local communities seen as squatters or laborers. Customary law was not entirely erased – many communities quietly kept their traditions alive in the shadows of the law – but it was **driven underground or** weakened.

By the time of India's independence in 1947, decades of state-centric forest management had left a legacy of alienation. Tribal populations had been displaced from many forests and their customary rights undermined. The new Indian government initially continued a similar policy the Indian Forest Act 1927 remained in force, and forests were a centrally regulated resource. In the early decades after independence, tribal communities still had no formal recognition of their **tree tenure practices**. This led to persistent tensions and occasional flashpoints. Some of the landmark protests in independent India echoed the themes of colonial times: the $\textbf{the 1970s} \, \text{in the Himalayan} \,$ foothills saw village women literally hugging trees to prevent them from being felled by commercial contractors. Their slogan "Forests for local benefits!" underscored the claim that these trees were theirs to protect and use, not the state's to auction. Similarly, the **Appiko Movement** in the Western Ghats (Karnataka) in the 1980s was a direct response to logging in ancestral forests; local communities, drawing on tribal

From the late 20th century, India began—slowly—to involve forest communities in governance. The National Forest Policy (1988) marked a turn from revenue to ecology and people's participation, leading to Joint Forest Management (JFM) in the 1990s. JFM gave villages a say in protection and a share of minor produce, but it did **not** confer ownership over land or trees. Still, it acknowledged that locals have a stake in forests.

A real break came with the Forest Rights Act (FRA), 2006. It sought to redress historical

injustice by recognizing individual cultivation rights and Community Forest Resource (CFR) rights, allowing communities to protect, regenerate, and manage forests. FRA also admits "other traditional rights," but it notably **does not** explicitly codify customary ownership of trees detached from land title. In practice, CFR implies collective rights to trees within the titled area, and individual pattas carry rights to trees on that plot. Yet the common situation where a family claims a specific fruit or resin tree on public forest land remains **legally grey**. FRA strengthens access to habitat but exclusive family claims to particular trees on state land

are not clearly validated. Even so, FRA and allied measures—especially PESA (1996), which empowers Gram Sabhas in Scheduled Areas—have enabled communities to reassert control. Many villages now map resource zones, record which clans use which patches, and craft local rules that tacitly honor tree allotments. In the Northeast, where Sixth Schedule and Article 371 protections long sustained community and clan ownership, FRA's role is narrower: the priority is documenting custom and reinforcing rules amid new pressures.

REGIONAL PERSPECTIVES

Central India (Madhya Pradesh, Chhattisgarh, Jharkhand, Odisha) shows this most vividly. Surveys record tens of thousands of trees claimed under custom—Santhal households alone list many thousands in Jharkhand; Sahariyas in Madhya Pradesh claim large numbers of salai resin trees. Rules emphasize inheritance and first-claimer rights. Mahua trees function as heirlooms: families clear and guard the floor beneath "their" trees; those without trees help harvest for a negotiated share. Among Sahariyas, first tapping establishes a continuing claim, with most productive trees held by families and passed down. Ritual respect for species like sal reinforces stewardship. No surprise this region has seen fierce struggles over "jal, jangal, zameen."

Northeast India presents a different legal ecology. In Meghalaya, Nagaland, and Mizoram, most forests are community or clan-owned under constitutional safeguards; "public forest land" is relatively limited outside reserves. With jhum cultivation, families often spare or plant trees that remain theirs across cycles; planted betelnut or orange trees confer inheritable rights. In places like the Pnar region, custom governs tenure entirelysome trees are communal, others privately held—with no parallel statutory tree tenure. Sacred groves exemplify collective, ritualized claims. In the Western Ghats, co-

lonial teak extraction and plantation regimes suppressed customary tenure more than elsewhere, yet practices endured. Maharashtra's tribal belts long recognized family claims over wild mango, jackfruit, or toddy palms. The **Appiko** movement (1983) reasserted community rights against commercial felling. The **Soligas** at B.R. Hills (2011) secured CFR within a wildlife reserve, formalizing customary governance; the Kadar still identify family honey trees and pools. Across the Ghats, village "temple trees" and commons persist under local norms.

Everywhere, where custom holds, conservation incentives strengthen; where it frays, market pressures can drive over-harvest. The test now is giving these living institutions clear, enabling recognition.

COINS USED IN ANCIENT RAJASTHAN DURING THE KINGS' RULE

ajasthan, the land of kings, warriors, and grand forts, has a rich history of commerce and governance that is intricately tied to its numismatic legacy. The coins used in ancient Rajasthan offer not just economic insights but also cultural, political, and artistic glimpses into the region's glorious past. From the early tribal republics and Mahajanapadas to the mighty Rajput kingdoms and the influence of Muslim rulers, the coins of Rajasthan evolved significantly over centuries. This article explores the types, significance, and evolution of coins used during the rule of various dynasties in ancient Rajasthan.

EARLY COINAGE IN RAJASTHAN (600 BCE - 300 CE)

The earliest coins found in Rajasthan date back to the Mahajanapada period (600-300 BCE), when parts of eastern Rajasthan were under the rule of powerful republics like Matsya and Surasena. The coins from this era were primarily punch-marked coins made of silver, which were also common across much of northern India.

These coins had multiple symbols punched onto them using small stamps. The marks often included geometric designs, the sun, trees, animals, and religious symbols. These were not issued by individual kings but by local authorities or merchants'

COINS OF THE MAURYA AND POST-MAURYA PERIODS

During the Mauryan Empire (322-185 BCE), Rajasthan became a part of the imperial economic network. The Mauryan silver punchmarked coins were used widely and continued the earlier tradition but with more uniformity and central control.

After the fall of the Mauryas, Rajasthan saw the emergence of Indo-Greek and Indo-Scythian influences in the northwestern regions. Coins from this period show Hellenistic features-portraits of kings on one side and Greek inscriptions. These coins, typically made of silver and copper, entered Rajasthan through trade and conquest.

GUPTA PERIOD AND REGIONAL KINGDOMS (320-600 CE)

The Gupta dynasty brought a golden age of coinage. Though their direct control over Rajasthan was limited, their coins influenced regional issues. Gupta coins were primarily gold (called dinars) and featured elaborate images of kings, deities like Lakshmi and Garuda, and Sanskrit inscriptions in Brahmi script.

In Rajasthan, regional dynasties like the Vatsagulma, Maitrakas, and others began issuing their own coins, mostly in copper and silver, imitating Gupta styles. These coins symbolized royal authority and were often inscribed with guilds and served as stannames and titles of kings,

RAJPUT COINAGE (7TH-13TH CENTURY

The Rajput era marks a significant phase in Rajasthan's numismatic history. Rajput kingdoms such as the Chauhans of Ajmer, Guhilots of Mewar, Rathores of Marwar, and Chandelas of Jalore issued their own coins that reflected both their political power and regional identi-

MATERIALS AND DESIGNS

Most Rajput coins were made of copper and silver, and occasionally of billon (an alloy of silver and base metals). The designs often included:

- Deities: Shiva, Lakshmi, or
- Royal symbols: Lions, sunbursts, or dynastic emblems.
- Scripts: Inscriptions were generally in Nagari or Brahmi, indicating the issuer's name or religious phrases like Sri Mahalakshmi or



Sri Rama.

FAMOUS EXAMPLES:

Chahamanas of Ajmer: Issued coins with images of a bull (symbolizing Shiva) and a horseman, which were later adopted by the Delhi Sultanate.

Guhilots of Mewar: Their coins depicted the sun, reflecting their Suryavanshi lineage (solar dynasty).

Rathores of Marwar: Favored coins with the image of a trident and sun, symbolizing Shaivite influence and divine kingship.



INFLUENCE OF MUSLIM RULERS AND SULTANATES (13TH-16TH CENTURY)

With the advent of the Delhi Sultanate, and later the Mughals, many parts of Rajasthan came under their control or influence. However, Rajput states often retained autonomy and continued to issue localized coins.

The Sultanate brought with it Islamic coinage traditions—featuring Arabic or Persian inscriptions, caligraphic designs, and religious

phrases like La ilaha illallah. Gold, silver, and copper coins were issued, often standardized by weight and metal purity.

Interestingly, even Rajput rulers who entered into alliances with Muslim rulers began issuing coins that reflected syncretic designs combining Persian inscriptions with traditional Hindu symbols.

MUGHAL PERIOD AND INTEGRATION (16TH-18TH CENTURY)

During the Mughal era, coins from Rajasthan saw further standardization. Mughal emperors like Akbar, Jahangir, and Shah Jahan introduced beautifully crafted coins with calligraphic artistry. The coins were minted in imperial mints, some located within Rajasthan, like Ajmer and Udaipur.

Akbar's Din-i-Ilahi coins were particularly notable, sometimes bearing inscriptions in both Persian and Sanskrit. Akbar allowed some Rajput rulers to continue issuing their own coinage as vassals, especially those loyal to the Mughal

Coins from this period were mostly silver rupees and copper dams, with weights and values strictly regulated.

POST-MUGHAL AND PRINCELY STATE COINS (18TH-20TH **CENTURY)**

After the decline of Mughal authority, Rajasthan saw a resurgence of local coinage under the Marathas and British-era princely states. Major Rajput states like Jaipur, Jodhpur, Bikaner, and Udaipur began minting their own coins under the authority granted by the British. These coins were often bilingual, with Nagari or Urdu on one side and Persian or English on the other.

Materials included copper, silver, and rarely gold, and designs combined local emblems, royal crests, and religious motifs. For example:

Jaipur coins sometimes bore the image of a sun with rays, symbolizing the Suryavanshi clan.

Jodhpur coins featured tridents and sunbursts, with inscriptions like Shri Jodhpur Rajya.

NETANYAHU 'KILLED ANY HOPE' OF GAZA HOSTAGES **RELEASE WITH STRIKE ON DOHA: QATAR PM**

DOHA, QATAF sraeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu "killed any hope" of releasing hostages still held in the Gaza Strip after Israel attacked Hamas leaders in Doha, Qatar's prime minister said ahead of appearing at the United Nations on Thursday.

The comments from Sheikh Mohammed bin Abdulrahman Al Thani underscored the wider anger among Gulf Arab countries over Tuesday's strike that killed at least six people.

"I was meeting one of the hostages' families the morning of the attack," Sheikh Mohammed told CNN in an interview aired late Wednesday. "They are counting on this (ceasefire) mediation. They have no other hope for that.'

He added: "I think that what Netanyahu has done (Tuesday), he just killed any hope for those hostages."

The raids on offices of the United Nations' food, health and children's agencies in Sanaa followed Israel's killing of Houthi Prime Minister Ahmed al-Rahawi and several Cabinet ministers in an airstrike the week before.

Korean workers detained in immigration raid bound for Atlanta and flight back home

More than 300 South Korean workers detained in an immigration raid at a Georgia battery plant last week headed to Atlanta on Thursday and a flight home.

South Korea's Foreign Ministry confirmed they were due arrive in South Korea late Friday afternoon. The developments came the same day South Korean President Lee Jae Myung called for improvements in the U.S. visa system as he spoke about the Sept. 4 immigration raid that

resulted in the arrest of more than 300 South Korean workers at at Hyundai's sprawling auto plant west of Savannah.

The Foreign Ministry said U.S. authorities have released the 330 detainees -316 of them Koreans — and that they were being transported by buses to Atlanta's Hartsfield-Jackson airport. The group includes 10 Chinese nationals, three Japanese nationals and one Indonesian.

The flight is back on track after an earlier departure had been canceled for an unspecified reason. Here are some

Muslim countries need to unite to stop Israeli aggression: Pak PM in Qatar

Pakistan Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif Thursday urged Muslim countries to unite against Israeli aggression as he met the Qatari emir and expressed solidarity following Tel Aviv's recent attacks targeting residential areas in Doha.

"Israel's brazen aggression in the Middle East must be stopped, and the Ummah needed unity among its ranks in the face of Israeli provocations," Sharif said

He conveyed Pakistan's strongest condemnation of the Israeli attack of September 9, calling it a blatant and flagrant violation of Qatar's sovereignty and territorial integrity, the statement said. He said that the "leader-

ship and people of Pakistan

were deeply disturbed by this

attack against the brotherly State of Qatar, which constituted a serious breach of international law," the state-

ment added. Sharif appreciated Qatar's responsible, constructive and mediatory role in efforts to bring peace in Gaza, and stressed that such acts of Israeli aggression were clearly meant to undermine regional stability and threaten ongoing diplomatic and humani-

tarian efforts, it added. While reaffirming the historic, fraternal bonds between Pakistan and Qatar, Sharif stated that the two countries had proudly stood with each other through thick and thin.

It was in this spirit of brotherhood that Pakistan stood shoulder to shoulder with the Emir, the Royal Family of Qatar and with the brotherly people of Qatar during this challenging time, the statement said.

Sharif assured the Qatari leadership of Pakistan's full solidarity and support in the face of this unjustified provocation.

He also conveyed deep sympathies on the loss of precious lives in this attack by Israel and prayed for the speedy recovery of the injured.

Sharif said that at Qatar's request, Pakistan had requested an emergency session of the UN Security Council to discuss the recent developments in the Middle

He also welcomed Qatar's decision to host an Extraordinary Arab-Islamic Summit on September 15, and

Poland restricted eastern airspace for three months after Russian drone incursions.

oland has restricted the airspace in the east of the country for the next three months following Russia's drone breach of the NATO member. A day after Warsaw said it shot down Russian drones which flew into Polish airspace during an overnight bombardment of Ukraine on Wednesday, Poland's Air Navigation Services Agency (PANSA) announced restriction measures would come into effect from Thursday.

Polish Foreign Minister Radoslaw Sikorski accused Moscow of deliberately violating sovereign airspace after Russian drones crossed into the NATO country before being shot down. This was the first time a member of the alliance had engaged Russian military assets over its territory, and the largest drone breach of NATO airspace.

Poland says UN will hold emergency meeting

Polish, Ukrainian and Lithuanian foreign ministers say act was deliberate and coordinated as Trump offers little support Poland said the UN security council would hold an emergency meeting over an incursion into the country by Russian drones on Wednesday as allies disputed whether it was a deliberate attack on Poland by Russia and Donald Trump offered little in the way of public support.

Poland's foreign minister, Radosław Sikorski, told local radio Poland planned to use the security council meeting to "draw the world's attention to this unprecedented Russian drone attack on a member of the UN, EU and Nato".

He added that Polish authorities had no doubt the act was deliberate. "Nineteen violations of our airspace, several dozen drones identified, a few shot down, the action lasting seven hours, the whole night - so we cannot say it was an accident," he said.

Sikorski and his Ukrainian and Lithuanian counterparts issued a statement calling the incursion a "deliberate and coordinated attack" and an "unprecedented provocation". However, Alexus Grynkewich, Nato's supreme allied commander Europe, said at a briefing on Thursday that it was still unclear whether the incursion was deliberate. "We do not yet know if this was an intentional act or an unintentional act," he said. He added that he had "low confidence" in Poland's claims about the number of drones.

US marks 24th anniversary of 9/11 terror attacks

Nearly a quarter century has passed since the Sept. 11, 2001, attacks, but for many, the emotions of the day remain raw as ever.

On Thursday, America marked the 24th anniversary of the deadly attacks with solemn ceremonies in New York, at the Pentagon and in Shanksville, Pennsylvania.

The commemorations were punctuated by moments of silence, the tolling of bells and the reading of the names of the nearly 3,000 killed. "I wasn't born when it happened, but it was really an important day in America," she said. "It's kind of the last time we all stuck together, and that matters."The 9/11 anniversary, often promoted as a day of national

unity, came during a time of increased politician tension. Usha Vance, had planned to attend but instead are set to visit with Kirk's family on Thursday in Salt Lake City, according to a person familiar with Vance's plans, but not authorized to speak about them publicly. Many in the crowd at ground zero held up photos of lost loved ones as a moment of silence marked

the exact time when the first hijacked plane struck the iconic twin towers. Loved ones then read aloud the names of the victims, with many giving personal remembrances, well wishes and updates on their lives. Zoe Doyle, daughter of Frank Joseph Doyle, said her family created a nonprofit in his honor that's built schools in South Africa and is feeding and educating thousands of children. Manuel DaMota Jr. said he remembers his father and namesake, Manuel DaMota, not just with grief, but with gratitude for the example he set."In a world filled with division and conflict, I do my best to honor my father by choosing connection, empathy and hope," he said. Melissa Pullis, whose husband Edward Pullis died in

It was another sign of a possible rapprochement between Washington and Minsk, a close ally of Rus-

sia that has faced Western isolation for years. U.S. President Donald Trump and Belarus' Alexander Lukashenko spoke on the phone last month, and the American leader even suggested a face-to-face meet-

ing could be in the works. That would be a big win for Lukashenko, who has ruled his nation of 9.5 million with an iron fist for

more than three decades. His country has been repeatedly sanctioned by Western countries both for its crackdown on human rights and allowing Moscow to use its territory in the invasion of Ukraine in 2022.

But for more than a year, Lukashenko has sought to mend ties with the West in the hopes of easing the

Voter List Forgery: Delhi Court dismisses criminal complaint against Sonia Gandhi

TDG NETWORK

Delhi court on Thursday dismissed a plea seeking registration of a First Information Report against Congress leader Sonia Gandhi, who was accused of fraudulently getting her name included in the electoral rolls in 1980—three years before acquiring Indian citizenship.

The court ruled that the allegations lacked merit.

DETAILS OF THE CASE

The plea was filed by Vikas Tripathi, who sought criminal action against

added to the voter list in New Delhi constituency before being a citizen of India. The petition alleged that Gandhi's name was included in 1980, removed in 1982, and reinstated in 1983 after she obtained citizenship.

The case was heard by Additional Chief Judicial Magistrate Vaibhav Chaurasiya at the Rouse Avenue Courts. The judge reserved the order earlier and delivered the verdict on Thursday. A detailed copy of the order is awaited.

Narang further pointed out that in 1980, documentation like PAN or Aadhaar was not used, and citizendocuments such as a passport or ration card.

He questioned why Gandhi's name was deleted from the electoral roll in 1982, stating, "Only 2names were deleted at that time-one was Sanjay Gandhi's, as he had passed away in 1981, and the other was Sonia Gandhi's. Why was her name

deleted? Because certain false documents were found, and it caused an uproar.'

According to him, Gandhi's name was reinstated in 1983 after she became an Indian citizen, but the irregularity in the earlier listing raised suspicion and warranted an investigation.

COURT'S OBSERVATION

The court, however, rejected the plea, finding no basis for proceeding with an FIR. It observed that the case lacked sufficient grounds and that the allegations were speculative in nature.

"What Is The Urgency?" SC rejects urgent listing of plea against India-Pakistan cricket match

The Supreme Court on Thursday refused to entertain an urgent plea seeking cancellation of the upcoming cricket match between India and Pakistan in the 2025 Asia Cup.

The matter was listed before a bench comprising Justices J. K. Maheshwari and Vijay Bishnoi after a lawyer sought expedited hearing. The India-Pakistan match is scheduled for September 14 at the Dubai International Cricket Stadium as part of the Asia Cup.

The bench, however, questioned the urgency and expressed its unwillingness to intervene. "What is the urgency? It's a match, let it be. Match is this Sunday, what can be done?" the bench remarked during the hearing. When the lawyer argued that the petition would lose relevance if not listed by Friday, the judges responded, "Match is this Sunday? What can we do about that? Let it be. Match should go on."

sports with the same country sheltering terrorists (sic)."

The plea further highlighted the emotional impact such a match could have on the families of the victims. "It can also hurt the sentiments of the families of the victims who lost their lives in the hand of the Pakistani terrorist. The dignity of the nation and security of citizens come before entertainment."

Concerns Over National Interest

The petition also raised broader concerns, describing the match as "detrimental to the national interests" and harmful to the morale of the armed forces and the country's citizens. It argued that the timing of the event undermines the sacrifices made by security forces and the grief endured by affected families.

Despite the petition's plea, the top court declined to entertain the matter urgently, effectively allowing the match to proceed as planned.

RAJASTHAN HC STAYS CHEATING CASE AGAINST SHAH RUKH KHAN, DEEPIKA PADUKONE

The Rajasthan High Court recently stayed the investigation into Bollywood stars Shah Rukh Khan and Deepika Padukone in a cheating case linked to the sale of a defective Hyundai car.

The stav also covers Hyundai Motor India's top executives, Unsoo Kim (Managing Director) and Tarun Garg (Chief Operating Officer), who were named in the complaint.

BACKGROUND

The case stems from a complaint by a resident of Bharatpur who purchased a Hyundai Alcazar in June 2022 from an authorised dealership. After driving the vehicle for nearly 67,000 kilometres, the owner reportedly encountered repeated technical and manufacturing faults. Despite multiple requests for a replacement or refund, the consumer claimed that Hyundai's response was unsatisfactory.

Frustrated with the company's handling of the matter, the buyer filed a crimi-

court subsequently directed the police to register a first information report (FIR), citing offences under cheating and criminal conspiracy provisions.

PETITIONERS ARGUE

LACK OF CONNECTION The petitioners - Shah Rukh Khan, Deepika Padukone, Kim, and Garg - contested their inclusion in the case, arguing that the allegations against them were "absolutely arbitrary and malicious." They asserted that the complaint did not reveal any cognisable offence committed by them.

"It was stated that the petitioners have no connection or nexus with the sale of the vehicle in question and do nal complaint. A magistrate not deal with consumer complaints for repairing or manufacturing defects in the sold car," the court record noted.

The petitioners contended that their roles did not involve consumer grievances or defect management and that implicating them in the FIR was unjustified.

COURT GRANTS STAY & ADVISES MEDIATION

After reviewing the matter, Justice Sudesh Bansal issued notices to both the police and the complainant and granted a stay on the ongoing investigation. The stay ensures that no coercive steps are taken against the petitioners while the court examines the case

Farmers' Protest Remark: SC to hear actor Kangana's plea for Quashing Defamation Case on September 12

The Supreme Court is set to hear on September 12 the plea filed by Bollywood actor and BJP MP Kangana Ranaut, challenging the Punjab and Haryana High Court's refusal to quash a defamation case filed against her.

A bench of Justices Vikram Nath and Sandeep Mehta will consider the matter, which stems from remarks allegedly made by the actor during the 2020-21 farmer protests.

Background

The case relates to a retweet posted by Ranaut during the farmer protests against the now-repealed farm laws. In the retweet, she allegedly compared a protester from Punjab to Bilkis Bano, the elderly woman associated with the Shaheen Bagh protests, which gained international attention after being featured in Time magazine.

The complaint was lodged in 2021 by Mahinder Kaur, a 73-year-old protester from Bahadurgarh Jandian village in Punjab's Bathinda district. Kaur claimed that the tweet falsely and mali-



ciously tarnished her reputation by associating her with an unrelated protest. She stated that despite her age, she had actively participated in demonstrations and sit-ins since the start of the agitation but had no connection with the woman from Shaheen Bagh.

According to her complaint, the tweet amounted to "false imputations and defamatory remarks" that damaged her dignity and lowered her esteem in the eyes of others.

Court's Decision To Dismiss Plea

Ranaut had filed the plea under Section 482 of the erstwhile CrPC seeking to quash both the complaint and the subsequent trial court's summons issued under Sections 499/500 of the IPC (now repealed).

The Punjab and Haryana High Court dismissed her plea on August 1, holding that the complaint was not mala fide. The judges observed, "There are specific allega-

tions against the petitioner who is a celebrity, that false and defamatory imputations by her in the retweet have dented the respondent's reputation and lowered her in her own estimation, as also in the eyes of others. Therefore, filing of the complaint to vindicate her rights cannot be termed mala fide."

The court further noted that the magistrate had carefully considered the material on record and recorded satisfaction that a prima facie case under Section 499 IPC was made out.

Arguments Raised By Kangana's Counsel

Kangana's legal team contended that the trial court lacked jurisdiction. They argued that after recording preliminary evidence, the magistrate called for a report from Twitter Communications India Private Limited (TCIPL) but failed to receive it before issuing summons.

The defense also argued that Ranaut had no intention to harm the complainant's reputation.

However, Justice Dahiya, delivering the High Court's order, observed,

"Non-receipt of report by TCIPL as to whether the alleged retweet has been made by the petitioner cannot be a ground to divest the Magistrate of jurisdiction under Section 202 CrPC."

The court explained that TCIPL was neither the owner nor in control of twitter. com and merely engaged in research and marketing, making its report irrelevant to the jurisdiction issue.

Court's Upcoming Consideration

With the High Court having dismissed her plea, Kangana has now approached the Supreme Court seeking

The revelation has prompted the state government to seek additional time from the court to reconsider its decision to blacklist the construction firm involved.

EXPERT REPORT SUBMITTED TO COURT

The report, prepared by a professor from the Maulana Azad National Institute of Technology (MANIT), Bhopal, was submitted before the division bench of Chief Justice Sanjeev Sachdev and Justice Vinay Saraf. It states that the bend in the bridge is far less sharp than portrayed and does not justify accusations of gross negligence solely based on the angle.

Madhya Pradesh government requested time to review its earlier action against M/s Puneet Chadha, the company responsible for constructing the overbridge in the Aishbagh area of Bhopal. The court accepted the request and scheduled the next hearing for September 17, also directing that copies of the expert report be shared with all parties.

CASE BACKGROUND

The petitioner, M/s Puneet Chadha, had been blacklisted by the government after public outrage over the flyover's sharp turn. The company approached the High Court seeking relief, arguing that the action was taken without giving it a chance to present its case. It asserted that the bridge's design followed the General Arrange ment Drawing (GAD) issued by the government and was completed under proper supervision.

The company claimed that the GAD was later amended between 2023 and 2024, and the final construction complied with revised guidelines. It further argued that the allegations of faulty design were based solely on the report of an investigative committee and lacked procedural fairness.

COMMITTEE FIND-INGS & GOVERNMENT ACTION

The government had constituted a five-member committee to examine the issue after images of the bend went viral online, sparking ridicule and concerns over

safety. The committee identified coordination lapses between the state government and the railways and pointed out that the overpass pillars were not installed at the prescribed distance. Additionally, the committee noted that the railway line passing under the bend might have contributed to design complications.

Earlier, on June 28, Chief Minister Mohan Yadav announced that seven PWD engineers were suspended, and a departmental inquiry was ordered against a retired superintendent engineer. The construction agency and design consultant were blacklisted, and a separate committee was tasked with proposing improvements to the overbridge.

The court earlier directed the petitioner to deposit Rs 1 lakh toward expert assessment fees, with the Municipal Corporation of Bhopal providing necessary resources. It had noted that if the petitioner's claim regarding the angle proved correct, the fee could be reimbursed and no strict action should be pursued against the firm.
